

The Elders to turn spotlight on neglected issue of child marriage Press Conference, New York, 20 September 2011

Archbishop Desmond Tutu, Mary Robinson and Dr Gro Brundtland will draw global attention to the neglected issue of child marriage during the United Nations General Assembly week in New York, 19-23 September.

Girls Not Brides: The Global Partnership to End Child Marriage, initiated by The Elders, will be presented on the world stage for the first time at a **press conference** at the **Clinton Global Initiative in New York** on **Tuesday 20 September**. The Elders will also speak at a number of other events (see below).

Each year, an estimated 10 million girls are married worldwide before the age of 18. That's more than 25,000 girls a day who are robbed of their rights and their childhood. Child brides usually drop out of school. Their health is put at risk - girls under 15 are five times more likely to die in childbirth than women in their 20s.

Dr Gro Brundtland, former Norwegian Prime Minister and former Director-General of the World Health Organization said:

"Child brides are among the most vulnerable, invisible and isolated people on our planet. Marrying so young, with no choice in the matter, is a gross violation of a girl's basic human rights, and is also a major challenge to development. If world leaders meeting in New York want to make real progress on global human rights, health, education and the fight against poverty, they cannot ignore child marriage."

Archbishop Desmond Tutu, Chair of The Elders, said:

"Child marriage is not a religious practice; it is a tradition that occurs in communities around the world. There are many good traditions that bind communities together. But traditions are also not static – they evolve. We can choose to change traditions that are harmful."

Girls Not Brides, a new global partnership to end child marriage, brings together dozens of international NGOs and grassroots organisations from every corner of the

world. *Girls Not Brides* will give greater visibility and leadership to the issue of child marriage and strengthen efforts to end it at local, national and global levels.

Mary Robinson, former President of Ireland and former UN High Commissioner for Human Rights said:

"At current rates, 100 million girls will be married in the coming decade. By ending child marriage we can empower these girls to fulfill their potential and help to transform their communities on an unprecedented scale. By mobilising global attention and more resources, we believe that change can take place in a single generation."
